



Te Paeārahi Mātua Whāngai



The first half of 2018 has proven to be both a challenging and exciting time for Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa, with the start of our Mauri Ora and Māhuri Tōtara wānanga in Te Tai Tokerau and Wairarapa. Yes, they are miles apart, but as noted these areas have highlighted a need for us to deliver our wānanga in their communities. So just a reminder, we would be more than happy to hear from you if you wish for Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa to hold our

wānanga in your rohe.

In addition, we have been very excited about re-introducing Te Paeārahi wānanga to train our next tranche of Kaiako who have completed the Mauri Ora and/or Tūranga Whānau wānanga. The following is an extract from a report where the strategy Te Paeārahi - Whakatipu Rangatira was first proposed:

In 2001 a paper was presented to Komiti Tumuaki outlining an overall strategy for growing leaders, "Whakatipu Rangatira." A framework of sorts was proposed that entailed

working in conjunction with Associate agencies to mentor and coach potential leaders. These leaders were identified as people who had taken up the challenge of working within whānau, hapū and iwi and who had completed Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa training. It was proposed that a component of the Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa training for those potential leaders identified should focus on Maori leadership including the coaching and mentoring system to be implemented in conjunction with their agency. The strategy shall focus on the development of Kaiako (facilitators) as leaders within their own whānau, hapū and lwi, Te Paeārahi.

Mātua Whāngai

We were excited to have been successful in the bid to co-design a new wānanga with Oranga Tamariki-Ministry for Children. The wānanga is for Caregivers to strengthen their capacity to care for our tamariki who have been taken from their whānau. The whakatauākī or metaphorical phrase which follows, acknowledges those who

play an integral role in the care and protection of tamariki Māori in Aotearoa. It recognises strength, courage and commitment of whānau, carers and supporters who have extended their warm embrace within, and beyond kinship ties and circumstance.

Mauri Ora is the workforce development programme based on our Cultural Imperatives - Wairua, Mauri, Tikanga, Whakapapa, Mana and Tapū.

Mauri Ora is a wānanga that has been delivered by Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa since 2004 and has been a most transformational experience for those practitioners and whānau who have embarked the journey.

Our two Mauri Ora sites this year are being delievered in Te Taitokerau and Wairarapa, North to South.

Matua Whāngai

"Nga ringa tauawhi o tauwhironui"

Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa is honoured to present Mātua Whāngai; a wānanga which acknowledges the legacy spoken of above, with a passion to further pursue the dreams and aspirations of our forbearing leaders who dedicated their lives to our most precious taonga; our tamariki and mokopuna.

Developed and Co-designed with Oranga Tamariki – Ministry for Children, Mātua Whāngai is another learning pathway created under the authority of Te Aratiatia which mandates the authenticity of Mātauranga Māori or indigenous knowledge in Aotearoa. Through traditional Māori narratives, understandings and analysis, Mātua Whāngai will work toward offering insight and knowledge invaluable to the growth of tamariki Māori in Aotearoa.

What is the wānanga about?

Mātua Whāngai is a kaupapa Māori wānanga which provides an exploratory space underpinned by Māori principle and philosophy. It aims to equip whānau and caregivers with fundamental knowledge and tools which informs best practice when working with tamariki Māori.

The Mātua Whāngai wānanga are made up of five seperate noho marae, from Friday to Sunday. Wānanga start in July 2018 through to November 2018

Where are our Kaiwhakaruruhau?

Since Te Korowai Aroha o Aotearoa have been active it is believed there are at least 3,500 Kaiwhakaruruhau who have come through their journey of our wānanga.
